Animals - Sale of Livestock

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13 Introduction

- 14 In the course of its research and teaching activities, Iowa State University has ownership of various
- 15 species of livestock. This policy addresses the sale of livestock, not other animals or companion
- 16 animals as defined below. Guidelines for the sale or disposition of research animals and companion
- 17 animals are available from the Office of the Vice President for Research. When livestock has
- 18 become surplus to the institution, all livestock with commercial value is to be sold. This policy
- 19 provides guidance for appropriate livestock sales and describes sales that are prohibited to avoid
- 20 conflicts of interest.

21 **Policy Statement**

- All sales of livestock must comply with this policy. Livestock which have been part of a research
- 23 study, teaching activities or extension/continuing education activities may only be sold if they pose
- 24 no threat to human or animal health and welfare as determined by the university's attending
- 25 veterinarian, the unit manager or the principal investigator consistent with the approval granted by
- the Institutional Animal Care & Use Committee (IACUC). The unit manager or the principal
- 27 investigator shall contact the university's attending veterinarian or another licensed veterinarian to
- 28 obtain health certificates for sales to other than processors/packers. For all sales the names of all
- 29 purchasers (i.e., name, company), a justification of sale price, market documentation and any
- 30 conditions of sale must be maintained as a part of the unit's business records. ISU Surplus is
- 31 available to assist with sales or provide policy guidance.

32 **Definitions**

- 33 Livestock is defined as agricultural production animals, breeding stock or regular farm animals from
- 34 any of the following groups: beef cattle, dairy cattle, hogs, chickens, turkeys, goats, horses, and
- 35 sheep (ewes, lambs, rams) as included in the Controller's Department Livestock Inventory Report.
- 36 Animal is defined as all vertebrate animals owned by Iowa State University, including livestock.

- 37 Companion animal is defined as a dog, cat and other non-livestock vertebrate approved as
- companion animals by the Office of the Vice President for Research, the appropriate dean, and the
- 39 director of ISU Surplus.

40 **Prohibited sales**

- 41 Prohibited sales of livestock include the following:
- Persons conducting livestock sales may not directly sell to themselves, other faculty and staff,
 anyone else in or associated with their department, including students, family members,
- 44 business associates, or other parties which may be viewed as creating a conflict of interest.
- Sales to business associates or a business entity, where any ISU faculty or staff member is part
 of a partnership or limited liability company are prohibited.
- Livestock is not to be sold to ISU employees, who fall outside the prohibited groups stated
 above, unless the livestock is purchased at a public auction or through a written competitive bid
- 49 process conducted by ISU Surplus and the ISU employee is the highest bidder.
- With the exception of cull livestock, sales to brokers are prohibited unless this is the only
 commercial outlet available. Before using a broker the unit manager or principal investigator is to
- 52 consult with the director of ISU Surplus.
- 53 Note, while not prohibited, use of ISU facilities to provide breeding/boarding services or short-term
- animal care services for faculty, staff and students shall be provided at the same rates charged for members of the general public.

56 Sales

- 57 Units shall utilize one or more of the following market sites to assist in determining market pricing as 58 appropriate:
- 59 USDA Iowa Department of Agriculture Market News
- Iowa Department of Agriculture Marketing and Promotion
- Local livestock exchange reports
- 62 Sales shall be conducted as follows:

63 Horse Unit

- 64 Horses are to be sold at public auction or by private treaty. The unit manager or principal
- 65 investigator, in counsel with the herdsman of the unit, is responsible for pricing at competitive rates
- 66 in the industry.

67 Sheep Unit

- 68 Sheep are to be sold at public auction, by private treaty or to packers. The unit manager or principal
- 69 investigator is responsible, with counsel from the shepherd, for establishing prices of animals sold by
- 70 private treaty and for evaluating bids by packers.

71 Swine Units

- Hogs, sows and boars are to be sold directly to packers on a grade and yield basis, unless the swine
- can be sold for greater return as breeding stock. Cull animals are sold by contacting brokers or
- 54 buyers for prices. Prices are evaluated by the unit manager or principal investigator and staff
- 75 members with knowledge of market prices. In many cases, collection of carcass data is required for
- research programs, thereby determining the marketing outlet.
- Feeder pigs and excess breeding stock may also be sold at auction or by private treaty based on
- highest anticipated return. The unit manager or principal investigator, with the counsel of staff
- 79 members, is responsible for establishing the selling price based on the current market.

80 Dairy Units

- 81 Excess dairy cows and calves deemed to be culls are to be sold at auction. Cows and calves with
- 82 value in excess of processor/packer market value are to be sold at public auction or by private treaty
- 83 based on prices established by the unit manager or principal investigator, with the counsel of staff
- 84 members. Prices are based on the current market. Day-old bull calves are to be sold at public
- 85 auction or by private treaty based on staff members' knowledge of sale barn prices.

86 Beef Units

- 87 Steers, heifers, cows, bulls and calves of above processor/packer market value are to be sold at
- 88 public auction or by private treaty. Prices for private treaty are established by the professors in
- charge of the units, with the counsel of staff members, based on knowledge of the market. Other
- 90 beef animals are to be sold directly to packers on a grade and yield basis. The market outlet may be
- 91 determined by price, as well as the ability to obtain carcass data for research programs.

92 Goats

- 93 Goats are sold at public auction and by private treaty. The unit manager or principal investigator,
- 94 with the counsel of staff members and based on the market knowledge, is responsible for
- 95 establishing prices of animals sold by private treaty. If neither option is available, goats may be sold
- 96 by utilizing brokers.

97 Chickens and Turkeys

- 98 Chickens and turkeys are sold to packers/processors, as determined by the unit manager or
- 99 principal investigator, with the counsel of staff members and based on the market knowledge.

100 Ag 450 Farm

- 101 Livestock of all types are sold directly to packers on a grade and yield basis, when appropriate to
- 102 maximize return. Cull animals are sold by contacting brokers or buyers by telephone. Prices are
- 103 evaluated by student farm committees and/or the entire AgEdS 450 class, with final approval of the
- sale given by the unit manager or professor in charge of the Ag 450 Farm. Carcass data for
- 105 evaluation purposes is often collected and may determine the marketing outlet.
